"City Ditch" Trail Connects Littleton History

The Littleton Community Trail, which follows the path of the City Ditch, was formally opened on March 8, 2015 as part of Littleton's 125th birthday celebration.

Charlie Blosten, the former City of Littleton Public Works Director, shown at right, spent five years acquiring the funding and right-of-way for this connecting trail, which showcases some of the oldest structures in Littleton.

The irrigation ditch called the city ditch is what brought Richard S. Little to this area in 1861. He was hired to correct mistakes made by an earlier surveyor so that water in the ditch would flow all the way to Denver. The city ditch still carries water from the South Platte River to Englewood. Parts of the ditch are on the National Register of Historic Places.





The community trail begins at Lower Ridgewood Park, near a rhyolite railroad trestle that was built in Richard Little's time. (This rhyolite, shown at left, is the same stone used to build the 1875 D&RG railroad depot.) The trail then parallels the ditch path north to the historic Littleton Cemetery.

Crossing Prince Street, the trail passes over Little's Creek and follows the railroad depression to Littleton Boulevard. It passes the 1908 courthouse and the 1888 Santa Fe railroad depot on its way north to Slaughterhouse Gulch.

This 1.8 mile trail connects our community to Littleton's oldest historic structures in a new way!
